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ALERT! PMC SECURITY REMOVES SNARES INTENDED TO TRAP ANIMALS ON SITE

On Friday the 12th of August 2022 at around 09:20am, the PMC security team identified red flags during their patrol. The security team provides a critical support service to the operations as they are accountable for the safety and harmonious co-existence of all assets at PMC including, people, wildlife and machinery. During their standard daily morning patrol, studying animal movements, scouting for poachers and examining overall order on the premises, the guards discovered acts of vandalism on company property.

The professionally trained team of guards found that the transformer at the East Return Water Dam was tampered with extensively, and its access gate opened and damaged. A preliminary investigation was initiated immediately seeking to source if the possible root cause for the damage to property could be illegal intruders on site.

The security team began studying the scene for possible hints and any possible leads that could assist them solve the mystery of this crime when they discovered human footprints on the ground. Immediately the guards began tracking the

footprints and as they proceeded along the path, they sighted another possible clue noting vultures flying in circles around Loole Dam area.

The team convinced that the animal behaviour could be a possible indication of some activity at the dam, proceeded towards Loole Dam and upon arrival, they discovered an impala carcass killed by a wire snare around its neck. A snare is a simple wire device, that is cheap and easy to make and set up. Snares ruthlessly kill thousands of animals across the world daily. Intruders set snares to kill and feast on the meat but at PMC, our security guards and rangers are active, always conducting routine searches to find and remove snares. In the unlikely event where intruders are successful and kill, the rangers will find and remove the animals before the intruders return.

On the same day, the Security team conducted a bush clearance search and successfully removed a total of 48 snares.

PMC would like to caution employees of intruders that illegally kill our hoofed animals and sell the bush meat on the black market. Employees are discouraged from supporting such trades.

Employees are also reminded to report intruders to our security or law enforcement and not approach intruders as they may be

armed and dangerous.

At PMC, protecting the lives of animals on site is our top priority and our security together with the rangers will continue working tirelessly to ensure intruders don't gain access to our premises.

Introduction

Palabora is dedicated to the protection of the environment in which its activities are conducted. We are particularly conscious of our proximity to the Kruger National Park and the abundance of flora and fauna in the area. We attempt to promote harmonious co-existence of people, industry and wildlife through education and responsible management.

Situation Analysis

The nature of the operations at Palabora involve the use and reuse of large amounts of water daily. This has resulted in many water bodies on the property that naturally attract wildlife during the drier months of the year, between May and December. The high concentration of plains game makes it favourable for predators to come on site, hunt and teach their young to hunt, as prey is in abundance.

Lion Management on PMC

Palabora believes in gathering data, so that informed decisions may be made on how to manage wildlife and minimise animal - human conflict on site as far as possible. Predator management relies on sufficient data capturing to determine the correct management procedures to be followed. In most cases the predators (lion, leopard, cheetah etc.) do not remain in one place for long periods of time and daily monitoring, sample collections and behavioural studies help Wildlife Management to determine the route forward. Monitoring and behavioural studies also help in determining the reason for the Predators' visit on site and in turn helps with future management strategies in order to prevent them from entering sensitive or high-risk areas. Predators, especially lions, play a vital role in the movement of herbivores such as zebra, buffalo and others. This in turn helps with veld management. Herds that stay in a specific area for long periods of time become easy prey, while the presence of predators like lion, force these animals to move, therefore preventing over-grazing of favourable grazing areas.

Poaching, Problem animals, Diseases and Human-Animal interactions

Lions are unfortunately often poached for body parts used in traditional medicines. Palabora has trained game rangers who can identify and address issues of poaching. Lions are pride (family) animals and are most seen in groups. When a lion is seen on his / her own for an extensive period of time, intensive monitoring is done to determine whether or not the animal is injured, sick or just a loaner. Injured or sick lions can become a safety risk and early detection of this is crucial. Problem (injured or sick) animals are reported to the local Nature Conservation authorities, evaluated, and appropriate action taken where necessary. Diseases are identified with the assistance of local veterinary services and the necessary precautions are taken to ensure that diseases do not spread any further.

Behaviour awareness

Lions are elusive animals that would rather move off undetected than to confront you, but they are fierce protectors of their young and prey. They will defend their offspring and food from anything that tries to come too close, often killing scavengers like hyena. The females will hide their young for the first week or two, after which they will introduce them to the pride. Lions sleep for up to 20 hours a day.

Uneasiness or displacement behaviour

Lions will vocalise their discomfort with a person's presence with a deep growl, often accompanied by a display of mock charging and slapping the ground, but if a lion is startled, cornered, injured or protecting something, they may storm a full charge without warning.
